

## In-Text Citations in Your Argumentative Essay

Your body paragraphs need to be rich with evidence. Draw from the documents A-V, and integrate them into the body paragraphs. Be sure to pick documents that directly support your topic sentence. The information may be paraphrased or directly quoted. In either case be sure to use in-text citations to tell your reader where the information came from. We learned from the last essay that MLA in text citations take the information on the left of the source. This is usually the author's name, but sources without an author often begin with the article name or the publication name. In these cases, put this left hand information in parenthesis at the end of a sentence.
